Out of the Blue by Robert Tregoning (author), Stef Murphy (illustrator), Bloomsbury, ISBN: 9781526627964






#### Rainbowsaurus by Steve Antony, Hachette Children's Group, ISBN: 9781444964523


### Death in the Spotlight by Robin Stevens, Penguin Random House Children's, ISBN: 9780141373829


#### Broken Hearts & Zombie Parts by William Hussey, Usborne, ISBN: 9781803700038



Jesse Spark has a broken heart and in a few short weeks he'll require major surgery to repair it - which means he only has a month to accomplish two almost-impossible tasks.


- 1) Shoot his epic zombie movie on a shoestring budget if he has any hope of getting into film school.

A positive and uplifting book for young people who are queer or questioning – and their allies looking to support them.



No Shame: a gueer life in suburbia by Tom Allen, Coronet, ISBN: 978-1529348941




'When I was 16 I dressed in Victorian clothing in a bid to distract people from the fact that I was gay. It was a flawed plan.'

No Shame is a very funny, candid and emotional ride of a memoir by one of our most beloved comedians. The working-class son of a coach driver, and the youngest member of the Noel Coward Society, Tom Allen grew up in 90s suburbia as the eternal outsider.

In these hilarious, honest and heart breaking stories Tom recalls observations on childhood, his adolescence, the family he still lives

with, and his attempts to come out and negotiate the gay dating scene. They are written with his trademark caustic wit and warmth, and will entertain, surprise and move you in equal measure.


Wallace has spent his summer in the lab breeding a strain of microscopic worms. He is four years into a biochemistry degree at a lakeside Midwestern university, a life that's a world away from his childhood in Alabama. His father died a few weeks ago, but Wallace didn't go back for the funeral, and he hasn't told his friends – Miller, Yngve, Cole and Emma. For reasons of self-preservation, he has become used to keeping a wary distance even from those closest to him.

But, over the course of one blustery end-of-summer weekend, the destruction of his work and a series of intense confrontations force Wallace to grapple with both the trauma of the past, and the

question of the future.

Deftly zooming in and out of focus, Real Life is a deeply affecting story about the emotional cost of reckoning with desire and overcoming pain.

From her rural beginnings running in the dust, to crushing her opponents on the track. To the falsehoods spread about her name, and the many trials she has been forced to endure publicly and privately. This is Caster's time to set the record straight and

share her story of how she became a defiant champion.
